
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# Behind The Old Face: Aging In America And The Coming Elder Boom

Few books on aging provide the multiple perspectives needed to understand the current aging crisis in America. Typically, the focus is singular. Facts and figures on demographic trends, advocacy or interviews with older persons are the focus. Caregiving issues may figure prominently or a proposed model for community is discussed. Rarely, do you see a combination of these topics. This book covers it all.Angil Tarach-Ritchey offers 30-years of nursing experience with the elderly, advanced professional training and limitless empathy to communicate the big picture about elders. Let's start with her background in nursing and as owner of a home health care agency. She is only too well aware of the disregard for elders in this society. "I have seen more advocacy for an animal than an abused senior," she writes, a caring perspective that radiates throughout the book.Part I provides a thoughtful review of the current climate of aging, including Angil's personal story. Topics range from her experience caring for the very sick elderly in a nursing home, while still an adolescent, to essential information about Alzheimer's disease. She also offers considerations about retirement--that is, are people prepared for the big transition from an active working life to creating a meaningful post-retirement?Current and future demographics further detail the reality we all face: families scattered and unable to care for their older relatives, lack of income among the very old and sick, breakdown of long-term care options, as well as isolation and neglect of older people. The ever-present concern about health care costs and the viability of Social Security, especially for the Boomer generation, are also addressed.

We are a caregiver (professional or otherwise), or we are someone who needs or will need a caregiver, or we are elderly or disabled and need to make decisions concerning our welfare, or we are middle-aged and want to plan for our elder years, or we have an elderly person in our life.
